The APW centennial anthology is nearing publication with a release planned by Feb. 14, Arizona's 100th birthday.

The cover image of *Skirting Traditions: Arizona Women Writers* and *Journalists 1912-2012* was unveiled at the APW holiday party. The cover showcases photos of five of the 28 women featured in the book: Esther Clark, a military affairs reporter for the *Phoenix Gazette*; Wilma Hopkins, a pioneering photojournalist who worked for the *Tucson Citizen*; Eulalia "Sister" Bourne, author of three autobiographical books about ranching and teaching; Meredith Howard Harless, a radio and television commentator and newswoman with KOY radio, KPHO-TV and KTAR radio; and Nina Mason Pulliam, a journalist and humanitarian who became publisher of the *Arizona Republic* and *Phoenix Gazette*.

"The images chosen by the editors for the cover are visually striking and intriguing – one woman is wearing a flight suit, another is dressed in ranch attire and a bola tie. We also wanted to include images of the tools of our trade: a typewriter, camera and microphone," says Brenda Warneka, coeditor and Arizona Centennial Legacy Project leader.

The back cover of the book speaks of the similar characteristics of the women in the anthology – their "resilience, creativity and grit to

Deadline looms for Children's book seminar



survive." Also featured on the back cover is a list of the APW award-winning authors who contributed one or more of the 28 chapters: Gail Bornfield, Vera Marie Badertscher, Carol Osman Brown, Jan Cleere, Jane Eppinga, Marion E. Gold, Carol (Cain) Hughes, Carol Jean La Valley, Barbara Bayless Lacy, Elizabeth Bruening-Lewis, Lois McFarland, Patricia Myers, June P. Payne, Marion Peddle, Sheila Roe, Pam Knight Stevenson, Arlene Uslander and Warneka.

"The editors have had many editing sessions to carefully review content and style," Warneka adds. "We worked with the contributors on fact-checking and, in some cases, missing information to ensure the anthology will be an accurate resource for college students and historians, as well as a good read for the public."

The book, with more than 300 pages, will carry a retail price of \$22.95 and be sold online from the publisher, Wheatmark. An e-version of the book is planned for a later release. The planning committee will coordinate with contributors to obtain copies at a discounted price in order to sell around the state at centennial events and speaking engagements.

A statewide marketing plan, which will reveal the names of all the women written about in the anthology, will kick off when the book is in final production. Sample copies of the book will be sent to targeted reviewers as part of the marketing plan. A second-tier national/international marketing plan also is intended.

"We anticipate that APW members and the public will be curious to read about the remarkable women profiled in the anthology," Warneka says.


The back cover of the book notes: "The narratives in 'Skirting Traditions' move forward from the beginning of statehood to the modern day, describing daring feats, patriotic actions and amazing accomplishments. They are women you won't soon forget."

Anthology available at Centennial Conference



Arizona Press Women will participate in the Arizona Centennial Conference through a panel discussion about their anthology, *Skirting Traditions: Arizona Woman Writers and Journalists* 1912-2012, and an exhibit table which will sell the anthology and other books authored by Arizona Press Women.

The conference, an official centennial event celebrating Arizona's 100th year of statehood, takes place April 18 through 22 at Pointe Hilton Tapatio Cliffs Resort in Phoenix. It provides a unique opportunity for people to share their love and appreciation for the Grand Canyon State's cultural and natural resources, offering a variety of workshops, presentations, poster sessions, tours and other events highlighting Arizona on Statehood Day.

The conference is the result of years of planning by representatives of the Arizona History Convention, Inc.; Museum Association of Arizona; and the Arizona State Historic Preservation Office. A program and registration information are expected to be available in February.


Webb launches new mystery

Set in northwest Arizona, the plot centers around the tragedies following the 1954 filming of Wayne's *The Conqueror*, where nearly half the cast and crew, and dozens of Paiute Indian extras died.

Storad, *Arizona Way Out West & Witty: Library Edition* is a humorous children's history and activity book designed to make learning enjoyable for grade-schoolers. The book delivers Arizona history with a side of fun by including gross, interesting and wacky stories and facts about the state, as well as crossword puzzles, games, recipes, crafts and other amusements. Ideal for teachers and homeschoolers, *Arizona Way Out West & Witty: Library Edition* also has a curriculum guide at the back of the book. In addition, schools and libraries that order a minimum of 30 copies receive a "Copies for Life" certificate of permission that allows them to

copy pages from the book for official school use. Personal use and sharing copied material is prohibited.

"We thank all the thoughtful children and adults who believed in *Arizona Way Out West & Witty* and took the time to vote for it," say the book's authors and publisher, Linda F. Radke of Five Star Publications, Inc., also an APW member, in a joint statement. "Children had to pull themselves away from their video games and adults had to squeeze time into their busy schedules to cast their votes. That shows they care very much about what children living in Arizona read."

The seminar is open to the public and coordinated by APW at the Arizona State Historical Society Museum of Papago Park, 1300 N. College Ave. in Tempe.

Lunch is included with admission for \$25 for members and \$35 for nonmembers if registered by Jan. 14, 2012 and \$35 for members and \$45 for nonmembers thereafter.

Exley, an independent writer and editor since 1995, is also an editor, writer and publicist for Chandler's Five Star Publications; co-author with Storad of "Arizona Way Out West & Wacky and Arizona Way Out West & Witty," which is currently up for ONEBOOKAZ for Kids; and former editor of "Arizona Parenting". Exley won numerous state and national awards for editing and writing. She was also community relations coordinator for Border's Books & Music of Mesa, handling the store's public relations, marketing and author events.

Storad is author of 38 science and nature books for children and young adults. In 2011, the National Federation of Press Women honored Storad's "Mars" as Best Children's Non-Fiction Book. In 2005, Storad's "Don't Call Me Pig! A Javelina Story" was selected by then-Arizona Gov. Janet Napolitano as part of her program to promote reading. More than 93,000 Arizona first-graders received a special edition copy. In 2001, Libraries Ltd. honored Storad with the Judy Goddard Award as "Arizona Children's Author of the Year." He worked at Arizona State University for more than 24 years, writing about science and scholarship, and was founding editor for "ASU Research Magazine" and for "Chain Reaction," a magazine for young readers.

Havill's first book, "Jamaica's Find," illustrated by Anne Sibley O'Brien, has been in print for 25 years. During that time Havill has published more than 40 other books for children including six additional Jamaica stories. Her books have been honored with the Ezra Jack Keats New Writer Award, Library of Congress Children's Books of the Year, Parents' Choice Award and Crown/Lamplighter Honor. Her verse novel "Grow" won the Santa Monica Public Library Green Prize for Youth Fiction. Havill teaches classes in writing for children at Pima College.
