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whether on the frontier of a young state or in a maledominated profession. They are women who in their time, by skirting traditions, were often controversial yet made significant contributions to the history of Arizona.

"These are women whom readers won't soon forget," says Brenda Warneka, APW member and co-editor who conceived the project. "What they had in common was their love of writing and journalism, and their ability to use the written word to earn a living, argue a cause and promote the virtues, beauty, history and people of the Southwest."

The 308-page paperback book was designated an Arizona Centennial Legacy Project by the Arizona Historical Advisory Commission.

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anniversary project, *News Women: 50 Years of Change/1954-2004*. Hopkins was excited to learn in 2009 that she would be included in the anthology. Unfortunately, she died shortly before the book was published and without knowing her photo is on the cover.

Hopkins began her career as a photographer at the *Columbus Citizen* when she was among women recruited during World War II to fill jobs vacated by men who had gone to war. She soon started writing the articles for which she was doing photography.

She and her husband, Bruce, moved to Tucson in the 1960s, where both worked for the *Tucson Citizen*. Hopkins retired in 1979. She was honored by the University of Arizona Department of Women's Studies in 2005 with a tile leaf in the Women's Plaza of Honor.

Hopkins was predeceased by her husband, who died in 1983. She is buried at the Funerarias del Angel South Lawn in Tucson.

Following is a letter Hopkins wrote when the *Tucson Citizen* folded:

The only way I have to express how much I'll miss the paper is to tell my story. Most of all I'll miss Billie Stanton. She is irreplaceable.

The summer of 1967 was the happiest time of my life. The *Tucson Citizen* gave me the chance to continue my newspaper career in a new town, in a new job.

The job was as city desk assistant, working with Tom Duddleston and Keith Carew. The staff was great – so warm and friendly, like a big family, pre computer with more time for each other.

I was able to continue my journalism career, which began in Columbus, Ohio, in 1942 as one of five wartime staff photographers on the *Columbus Citizen* newspaper.

In 1956, I had gone to New York and married Bruce Hopkins, a *New York Mirror* photographer. The paper folded. John Hemmer, a former staffer there, offered Bruce a job here. So here we were. I retired when I was 62.At the *Tucson Citizen*, we made

longtime personal friends, such as my 30-year-friend Allison Hock-Rose, who started as a teen intern. She recently was in town, and we discussed old times.

From the old building, these staffers deserve to be remembered – and bosses, too: William Small Jr., Paul McKalip, George Rosenberg, Clyde Lowery, Tony Tselentis, Mary Brown, Mary Moody, Micheline "Mike" Keating, Nicki Donahue, Ellen Crosby, Anne Ross, Corky Simpson, Bill Hopkins, John Winters, Dan Pavillard, Sue Giles, Mary Gerdan Hunt, Judy Terlizzi, Regis McAuly, Paul Allen and Jeannie Jett.
