the attendance of as many APW members as possible at the 2012 National Federation of Press Women conference this month in Arizona. The opportunity to participate in this annual event on our home turf doesn't come often.

In the 58 years since APW became an affiliate of NFPW in 1954, we hosted the group in 1956 at Hotel Westward Ho, Phoenix; in 1971 at the Camelback Inn, Scottsdale; and now, 41 years later, at Hotel Valley Ho, Scottsdale. Don't let the opportunity to attend at least part of this extra-special communications conference pass you by!

At the conference planning session in August, the committee discussed new registration alternatives for those who cannot make time to attend the full conference September 20 through 22. You can of course sign up to attend by the day, but if you can spare only half days, on Friday and Saturday, we are now offering morning sessions, which include breakfast, or afternoon sessions, which include lunch, at \$55 each half day for members. You are encouraged to invite your friends or acquaintances from other writing groups to join you at this same \$55 rate or the general public may attend at a rate of \$65. Join us for the opening event on Thursday night at the Arizona Historical Society museum at Papago Park for only \$40, which includes entertainment, food, and wine tasting. APW members are encouraged to add to the fun by wearing Western

Volunteers at the opening event pay \$20 instead of \$40 and other conference volunteers pay only for the conference meals they partake and may sit in on sessions when not working if they purchase a meal. All the tours APW offers as part of the conference events are a go. This means enough people have paid for each tour to break even. #### Volunteers needed for NFPW Conference registration

FPW has asked APW to supply some volunteers to work the registration table for 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary NFPW Conference at the Scottsdale Valley Ho, and Cheryl Kohout is working on a sign-up sheet to accomplish the task.

APW volunteers do not need to pay the whole NFPW conference fee. They can pay for the meal only (breakfast at \$35, lunch at \$45 or \$80 for both). However, volunteers still need to register. Volunteers can also attend some seminars if they pay a meal fee for the day. For example, on Friday or Saturday, volunteers can work a morning shift, pay for lunch and have a choice of six afternoon seminars for just the cost of the



meal. Volunteers are needed for these shifts:

- Wednesday, September 19: 4 to 7 p.m.
- Thursday, September 20: 7 to 10:30 a.m., 10:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 2 to 5:30 p.m.; for evening shifts, see the cover story, *Half-price deal*

- Friday, September 21: 7 to 10 a.m., 10 a.m. to noon, 5 to 7 p.m.
- Saturday, September 22: 7:30 to 9 a.m., 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., 6 to 7 p.m.

5:30 to 9:30 p.m. on September 20. APW members who volunteer to help set up the event at 4 p.m. and welcome NFPW members to Arizona can enjoy the festivities for just \$20. #### **APW Board Meeting review**

Highlights from the APW Board Meeting held Sunday, August 19 are as follows:

The treasurer's report by Cheryl Kohout shows we have unrestricted funds in the bank of \$6,989.13 and \$632.69 in scholarship funds. The Latty-Hurlburt scholarship funds are scheduled to be depleted this year. The budget shows \$2,000 was voted on at the general membership meeting in May to sponsor expenses related to the 2012 NFPW Conference.

Gail Herne reported that Rim Country is providing up to \$500 for expenses of the opening night event at the NFPW Conference, and Barbara Lacy reported that Central District is advancing funds for the purchase of the participants' tote bags.

Brenda Warneka, project leader for the Centennial Legacy Project, reported there are several events planned for *Skirting Traditions* in the fall including one to be scheduled at the Arizona Historical Society Museum at Papago Park and another to be rescheduled at the Sharlot Hall museum in Prescott.

Sheila Roe, the anthology treasurer, provided a cash flow report from inception of the project through July 31, which showed sources of cash \$24,659.79 and uses of cash \$18,131.20, with cash on hand July 31 of \$6,528.59. The revenue report through July 31 showed \$4,220.11 in net profits available to APW for the scholarship program.

Official delegates to the NFPW conference are Brenda Warneka as affiliate president and Pam Stevenson, Cheryl Kohout and Gail Hearne elected at the May general membership meeting. Sheila Roe, who was also elected, is unable to attend, so one of the alternates will take her place. Alternates are Christy Powers, Patricia Myers and Glennis McNeal.

APW will purchase copies of *Skirting Traditions* at cost from the anthology project to be included in the NFPW conference tote bags and as speakers' gifts. The money will come back to APW from the anthology project as scholarship funds.




