## Rim County recap: Next meeting on July 28

crowd of 50 people gathered at the Payson Public Library on June 18th to hear Pat Gail Hearne, a Payson writer and historian, discuss her well-documented presentation about the historic plane crash in the Hellsgate wilderness near Payson, which involved the famous MGM lion, Leo.

The Hollywood studio grabbed national headlines in September of 1927, when it attempted to fly the 350pound lion in a special plane from San Diego to New York City. Both the pilot and lion survived due to rescue efforts by local cowboys.

Hearne, a former teacher, has published newspaper and magazine articles about the event. She enjoys presenting Arizona history programs to the public.



### Audio book

Skirting Traditions has been chosen as a selection to be produced as an audio book by the Arizona Braille and Talking Book Library.

The library is a division of the Arizona State Library, Archives, and Public Records and part of a nationwide program known as the National Library Service. The program produces audio books for individuals who are

unable to read print books due to visual or other physical disabilities. There is no charge for the service.

Volunteers produce the audio book through a lengthy process that involves recording, detailed reviewing and editing. It is expected that it will be at least six months before the *Skirting Traditions* audio book is available for release.
